Mikael Skoglund at Royal Institute of Technology (KTH), Stockholm, Sweden as a postdoctoral researcher in September 2012 and joined our department on March 2013 as an Assistant Professor.

It is indeed a great pleasure and meaningful turning point of my life that I came across with the new job at City University of Hong Kong. This is my first time in Hong Kong. I am still trying to learn many of local stuffs. However, I am quite confident that through the support, expertise, and richness of the people I have met in our department, I will be given the opportunity to contribute to this stimulating environment and grow as an academic.

Up to this point, I do not describe what type of research I am conducting. My research interest is in general areas of communication theory and communication signal processing. The emphasis of my current research is on multiple-input multipleoutput (MIMO) wireless communication systems. MIMO signaling schemes allowing the transmitter to adapt to the channel state information (often called closed-loop MIMO) have become a promising technology for the next generation wireless standards and beyond. Over the past few years, much work has been done to investigate solutions in this area. However, there are still many problems to be addressed in the closed-loop MIMO such as channel correlation, closed-loop in fast fading channel, and imperfection in channel feedback. My current research goal is to develop and analyze schemes/algorithms to make the closed-loop MIMO practical and validate them. Furthermore, I am planning to develop a research program at CityU based on solving both theoretical and applied problems arising in communication and signal processing area. I believe teaching is an integral part of a career in research. Teachers shape the way students look at engineering problems and motivate incoming graduate students to involve in advanced research problems. I also would like to identify students' interests, tailor research, and guide students for having desired effects.

There would be many of challenges and obstacles ahead of me. However, I always try to convince myself in such a way that 'you can become whatever you want to be, if you constantly contemplate on the object of desire with faith' (-The Bhagavad Gita). You have the power to act, but you do not have the power to influence the result. Thus, you must act without the anticipation of the result but without succumbing the inaction.
