My Pre-departure Checklist

I applied for student visa right after I got my admission letter. As you need to make a reservation for the visa interview, you better plan for your preparation work carefully.

You need to decide whether you want to rent an apartment or live in the student residence. I need to sign a contract with the university before a deadline to guarantee a residence place, so make your decision early.

My host institution requires us to purchase a health insurance, so you should also think about it. Besides health insurance, travelling insurance is another must for you.

Just Arrived...

I searched on the social networks to find some student organizations in the host institution which provides pick-up service for freshmen before I booked the air tickets. You should check the pick-up time and site carefully. With the preparation work, when I arrived at Chicago O'Hare International Airport, I got on the shuttle bus in no time.

I signed up for the orientation for international students. The warmhearted volunteers helped me carry my baggage to my residence. After that, we joined a welcoming dinner, during which we chatted and had pizza in the lawn.

Orientation

I joined the orientation which is called BGR (Boiler Gold Rush) in Purdue. And if you join BGR as an international student, you can join the BGRi designed for international students for free.

During BGRi, I opened my bank account, purchased SIM card for my phone and bought all the daily necessities I need. BGRi is very helpful for international students to get used to the everyday life in the US.

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BGR introduces university life to all the freshmen, no matter you are from abroad or local. The staff spent a whole year to prepare for the BGR, and you should never miss it!

There are several interesting traditions in Purdue during orientation period. One is called "Crossing the Tracks", during which all the group members of my BGR team jumped over the track arm in arm. Another is called "Fountain Run". All freshmen needed to run through all the four fountains on campus.

My Place

I lived in the residence hall on campus, which is relatively safe compared to other off-campus accommodation. If you come back from school late at night, you can call the campus security to escort you to your residence hall.

My First Class

The campus is really huge compared to that of CityU. So before your first class, you should get some ideas about the buildings and campus map to make estimation on time for travelling.

The education system between Hong Kong and U.S. is quite similar, however, I still had some difficulties in adapting to the learning environment there. The biggest difference between my school life in Hong Kong and the U.S. is the heavy workload there. What surprised me most during my first class is that, we had assignments every week, projects every two or three weeks, and quizzes happened much more frequently than in Hong Kong. And the semester consists of 15 weeks, which is 2 weeks longer than that in Hong Kong. But thanks to this, I could spend much more time on studying and I think I have made big improvement in my professional fields.

People I Met

I made a lot of friends during the international orientation. We sat around the long table in dining court and talked a lot about the life style back in our hometown during lunch time.

People in the small town West Lafayette where Purdue is located are very helpful. When I just arrived there and was not very familiar with the surroundings, people there offered great help.

When you stand on the pedestrian and check the map using your

smart phone, people will just come over and show you the way to your destination.

Americans are very easygoing as they will greet you when meeting you on the road, even though you do not know each other.

Out of Classroom

University students in the US really love sports. Among all the games, they definitely love football the best. If there is a football game, the campus will be full of audiences and the campus radios will be reporting the game for the whole day.

Money

I brought certain amount of cash to the US (at least enough for the first several weeks).

You may open an account in the local bank after arrival, so that your parents can send you money just in case.

I also brought a credit card with me. It was very useful for online shopping. When I travelled in the US, credit card was that important for making reservation of hotels and booking air tickets and train tickets.

What a pity that I had to leave when I had just got used to the life in Purdue. I will miss my friends there, and maybe I will go back to pursue my Master Degree soon.

"Applied Research Internship Scheme in Electronic Engineering" offered under the Master of Science in Electronic and Information Engineering (MScEIE) programme is two semesters long. It provided me an opportunity to integrate and apply what has been learned during taught postgraduate through working on an applied research project taking place in a research environment.

My project was carried out at University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) under the supervisor of Prof K N Tu.
